
KÔRERO MAI TALK TO ME THE BOARD GAME





KÖRERO MALI TALK TO ME - THE BOARD GAME

AGES 4+ | 2-4 PLAYERS MUST BE AT LEAST ONE ADULT AND ONE CHILD

Designed so you can start conversations with your child that will build their confidence in talking with you about sensitive topics. A relationship where you can talk easily about many different things will keep your child safer from people who might try to harm them.

Equipment

- Printed playing board
- Printed and assembled dice
- Printed and cut out question cards
- Printed and cut out 'No' cards
- Printed blank Rainbows
- Felts for colouring in (not included)
- Buttons, coins or tokens for moving around the board (not included)

Instructions

Set up the board with a pile of adult questions and a pile of child questions. Each player gets a blank Rainbow and 8 'No' cards.

Place tokens on 'Go'

The oldest person goes first and rolls the dice. They move forward the number of squares indicated on the dice. The colour of the square they land on indicates which questions will be asked.

Purple: The adult has to answer the question

Orange: The child has to answer the question.

Whoever answers the question is then able to fill in a colour on their personal rainbow. The person who reaches the end of the game with their whole rainbow coloured in is the winner.

If all the questions have been asked, reshuffle them and start again.

Wild Rainbow

If anyone lands on a 'wild rainbow' square, they must lead a 'wild rainbow' walk around the room, which must include at least one peculiar action and everyone must follow their lead. No rainbows are coloured in. This is their turn, and the next player rolls the dice.

More than two people playing?

If there are more than two people playing, the person whose turn it is can nominate which child or adult must answer the question BEFORE the question is read aloud.

Don't want to answer a question?

If you don't feel ready or able to answer a question, use one of your 'No' cards. If you use a 'No' card, you can not fill in the colour of the rainbow.



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SUPPORT FOR PARENTS WHEN ASKING/ANSWERING QUESTIONS

This game is designed to build connection. If it results in someone being upset or in anger or frustration, it is better to leave it until another day. The important thing is the talking, NOT winning!



Some basic tips

If you are upset about something your child has said, take 15 minutes to have a quick break before you come back to them.

Remind them that you love them, no matter what.

Be yourself, that is what builds connection with your child

Never force answers

- If someone doesn't want to answer a question, that is okay.
- If someone doesn't want to do the 'Wild Rainbow' that is okay too.

There are no wrong answers.

There should be no judgement. This means.

- No criticisms.
- It is okay to ask more questions if your child seems open to that, but don't say anything that might make your child feel like they have answered "wrong".

No cards

These are designed to help your child build boundaries.

It is very important to respect a 'No' card. This means not asking again, and not pressuring the child to give an answer.

Wild Rainbow

This is designed to give everyone a laugh to release any tension that people are holding internally about the questions.

Be as silly as possible!

If you have safety concerns about your child

Your child may give answers to this game that make you concerned. Keep breathing!

Talk through your concerns with another adult, before addressing it with your child.

You can call Safe to Talk on 0800 044 334 to talk through concerns about sexual harm.


You can talk to a school about concerns about bullying.
